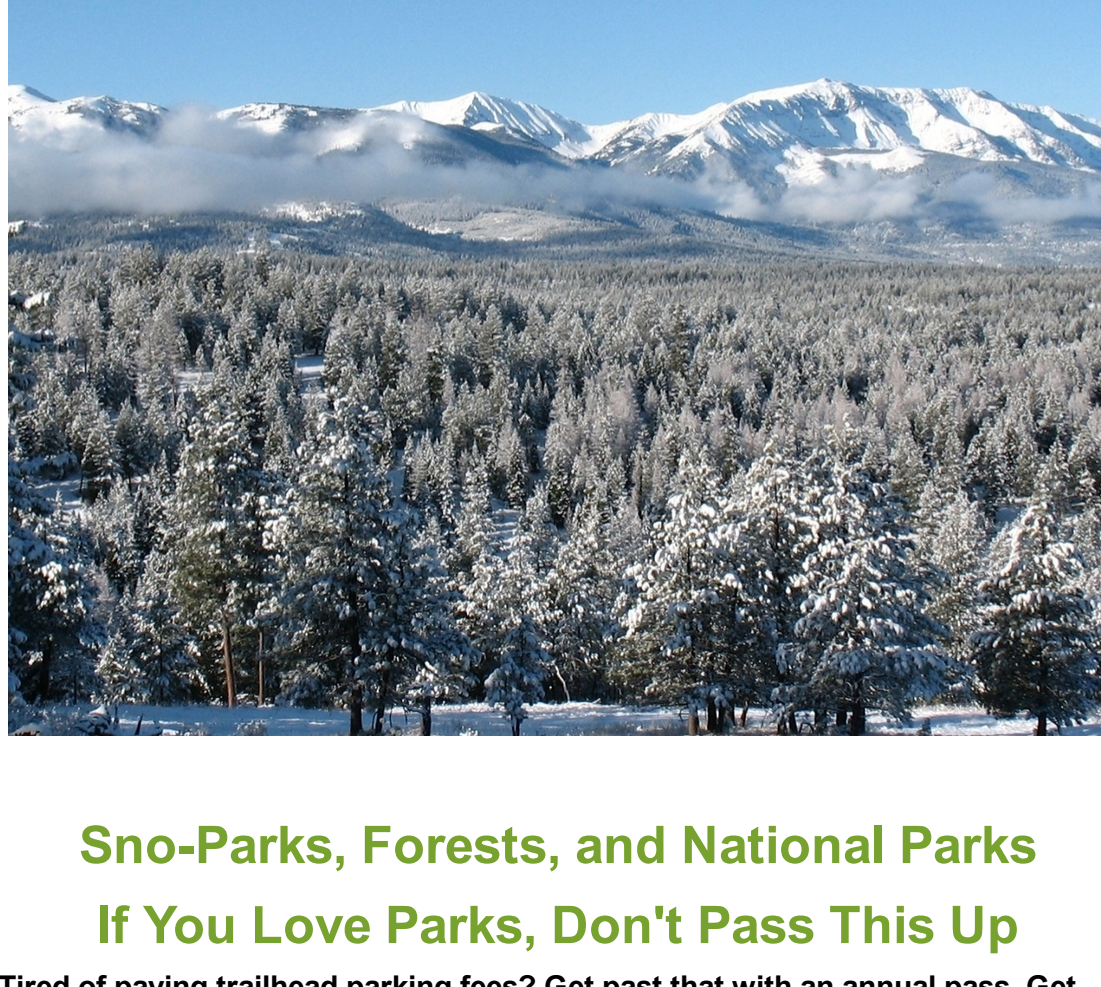

Tired of paying trailhead parking fees? Get past that with an annual pass. Get one of these wilderness passes for yourself or your hiking buddy...and support our work at Oregon Parks Forever!

Did you know that Oregon hosts 5 properties managed by the National Park Service? Crater Lake, John Day Fossil Beds National Monument, Oregon Caves National Monument, Lewis & Clark National Historical Park, and Newberry National Volcanic Monument.

We now carry in [our shop](#) "The America the Beautiful" annual pass which is good for a year's worth of visits to more than 2,000 federal recreation sites across the country, including all the

National Park Service, U.S. Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation and US Fish & Wildlife Service facilities.

What about hiking and biking on Mt. Hood? OPF has you covered there. Go for the Northwest Forest Pass for trailheads in Mount Hood and other National Forests.

Ready to Hike? The annual Northwest Forest Pass is valid at the following national forests: Columbia River Gorge, Colville, Deschutes, Fremont-Winema, Gifford Pinchot, Malheur, Mount Baker-Snoqualmie, Mount Hood, and Ochoco; Also includes the Okanogan and Wenatchee, Olympic, Rogue River-Siskiyou, Siuslaw, Umatilla, Umpqua, Wallowa-Whitman, and Willamette.

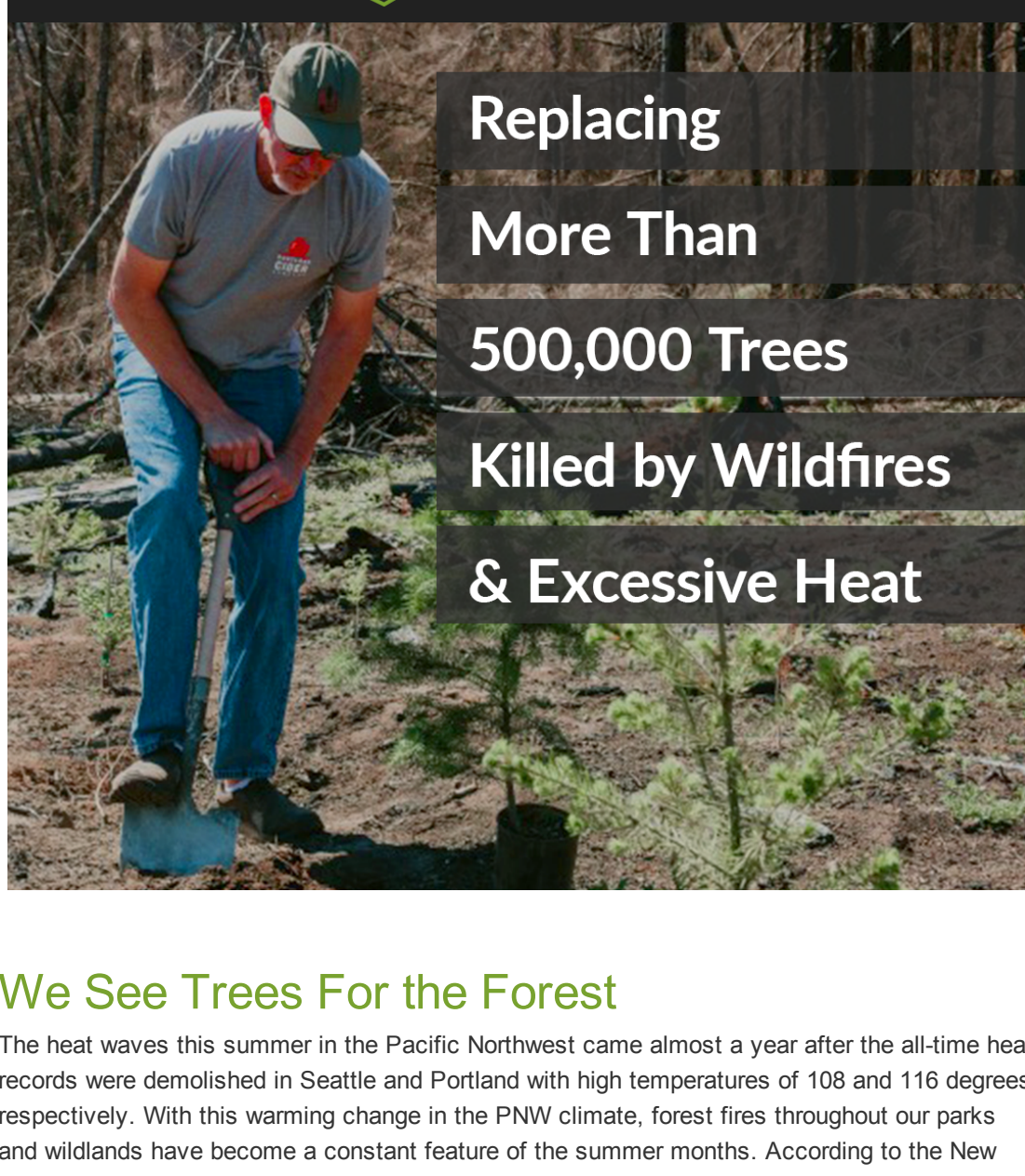
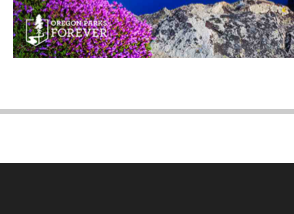
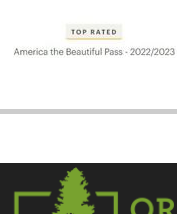
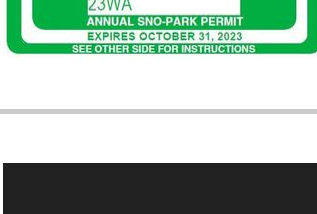
Get your skis waxed, sleds, and snowshoes ready because we also sell Oregon's Sno-Park permits.

We See Trees For the Forest

The heat waves this summer in the Pacific Northwest came almost a year after the all-time heat records were demolished in Seattle and Portland with high temperatures of 108 and 116 degrees, respectively. With this warming change in the PNW climate, forest fires throughout our parks and wildlands have become a constant feature of the summer months. According to the New York Times, more than 100 notable fires were active across the western U.S. as of September 9.

Anyone, who sat in the smoke after the Labor Day fires of 2020, recalls the devastation experienced in the Santiam Canyon, as we all wondered what we could do to help. After assisting the people affected by these fires and a major effort to clean up burned trees, Marion County is ready to green the canyon again! Volunteer tree planting efforts will be available in January, February, and March (watch our website for more specifics), and we are working with the county to raise the funds to plant 300,000 new trees in Marion County parks.

Oregon Parks Forever established a wildfire replanting fund in September of 2020 to provide funds for tree restoration in areas affected by wildfires. In 2021, we funded the replanting of 553,000 trees at Collier State Park, Silver Falls State Park, Ben & Kay Dorris State Recreation Area, North Santiam State Recreation Area, the Tillamook State Forest, as well as other local parks in Marion and Josephine counties. Including an initial 65,000 trees in Marion County.

Forests are an essential component to combat a changing climate. Mature trees help cool the planet by storing 22 pounds of carbon into their trunks, branches, and leaves — and releasing oxygen back into the atmosphere. When forests burn, they release the carbon dioxide as greenhouse gases warming the globe even further. Trees attract birds and provide habitat for a wide variety of wildlife, preserving biodiversity; their deep roots store water and prevent soil erosion; forests can act a filter upstream to keep our drinking water clean downstream; they enhance our lives by adding beauty to our communities and parks.

New Memberships for Fall Campaign

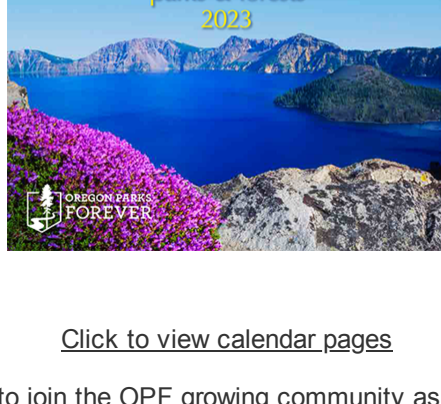

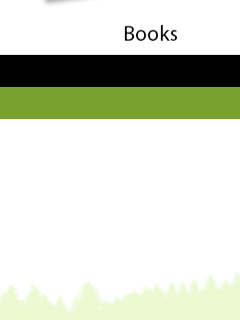

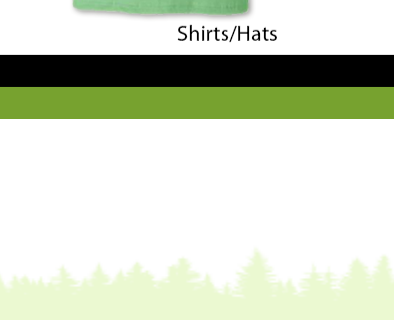
